From the Desk of Deacon Chris...

THE PARABLE OF THE PRODIGAL SON – DO WE EVER IMITATE THE ELDER BROTHER?

I preached this past weekend on the Gospel of John, and Jesus giving his disciples, and us, a new commandment. Jesus instructed us to “Love one another as I love you.” Sunday evening, I was still thinking about the gospel reading, and I got to thinking about the Parable of the Prodigal Son which is found in the Gospel of Luke. We are all familiar with the story. The younger son went to his father, and asked to receive his full inheritance. The father grants his son’s request without question, and the younger son promptly goes off and spends all of his inheritance on questionable, and quite possibly, sinful living. Finally, the son has nothing left and is living in extreme poverty when he realizes that he can return to his father and beg for forgiveness. The son returns to the father, and the father embraces him, and joyfully throws a huge party to celebrate the return of his lost son. Clearly, we see in this parable the love of the father who represents God the Father, and we also can see the love of the younger son who knows his father loves him despite the poor choices he made.

What about the elder son? The parable tells us the elder son returned from the fields to find out from a servant that his brother has returned, and his father is throwing a celebration in joy. One might think the elder son would also be overcome with joy, but we find that just the opposite is true. The elder son is angry, even outraged, at the news and refuses to join the celebration. Even when his father comes out to him and pleads with his son to share the joyful love and happiness of the younger son’s return, the elder son still will not enter into his father’s love. Clearly, the elder son does not understand the measure of his father’s love.

You know how sometimes I have said we can do the right things, but for the wrong reasons. Perhaps the elder son is a good example of that. In his dialog with his father, the elder son angrily says that had always served his father, and never once disobeyed his orders. While that is very possibly true, the son does not indicate his service has been out of love for his father. In fact, we can sense his anger, resentment, and jealousy from the elder son’s remarks. Perhaps we can all relate to times when our anger, resentment, or jealousy clouded our own judgment, and shielded us from the love of another person, and the love of Jesus in our lives. The question we have to answer is how long do we hold on to these negative feelings and emotions? Do we allow them to control our lives in anger, or do we rise above our feelings and allow the love of Jesus to fill our hearts?

This is Mother’s Day weekend, so I want to close by asking the Lord to bless all mothers, both living and deceased. Perhaps we need look no further than our own mothers to find an example of the unconditional love of Jesus in our lives. I hope you join me in saying, “Thank you mom; I love you.” God bless.


Blood Pressure Screening THIS weekend. Stop in and have your blood pressure checked and your blood sugar read by a Registered Nurse

Health Tips: *Rise and shine: Early birds make better food choices* "Early to bed, early to rise makes a man healthy, wealthy, and wise," Benjamin Franklin famously said. Cue eye rolls from the night owls out there! Wealthy and wise are up for debate, but early risers — both men and women — may indeed have a health edge. Previous research has shown that night owls have higher rates of diabetes, obesity, and heart disease, and a new study helps to explain why. Compared with night owls, morning people make better choices throughout the day, according to the research. Night owls tend to eat more sugary foods in the morning, more sugar and fat at night, and less protein overall. If you're a night owl and these patterns sound familiar, don't worry — you are not destined to ring in every midnight with a cheesy burger and ice cream! Consciously plan meals you love that are nutritious. Choose a protein-rich breakfast, and swap out junky snacks for nourishing plant foods (think fresh fruit, nuts, hummus and carrots). Want to hop on the early train? Genetics play a part in determining whether you're inclined to burn the midnight oil or rise with the birds, but you can shift your habits. Try going to bed a half-hour earlier than usual to start, setting aside an hour before bed for winding down (no screens!), and set your alarm for the same time every morning. Or bust out your tent and sleeping bag, and head for the woods (or your own backyard!): Research shows that camping for a week can help to reset your body clock! <http://www.clevelandclinicwellness.com>
